		<u>Fig Tree Valley</u> – This is a natural and cultural landscape. The Clark Brothers had a camp in this valley. Exact location unknown. <i>Brigandi</i>	
		<u>Parks Canyon Cow Camp</u> – Exact location unknown. By 1916 Joseph Parks controlled nearly 3,000 acres of range in this area. <i>Brigandi.</i>	
		<u>Horse Canyon</u> - This canyon was used by the Hamilton and Contreras brothers as cattle range. <i>Brigandi.</i>	
		<u>Contreras Brothers Site</u> - The Contreras brothers homesteaded in Anza in 1910. Horse Canyon, Anza Valley and White Wash were all used for running cattle. Camp is possibly 1-mile up Horse Canyon below the Junction with White Wash, near some cottonwood trees. <i>Lindsay 1978</i>

The spring currently flows into the features, constructed in the 1950s. Morretti Junction at the mouth of Carrista Canyon
Warners Ranch		P-37-028852	A historic site consisting of three water features: an underground water tank approximately 8 feet in diameter, a drinker, and remnants of an earthen dam at the lower end of a minor depression. An intact dam approximately 12 m long occupied this location until recently, according to Native American monitors.
